Disproportionality in Re-vetting

- 1. At the request of the MPS, the Panel will be considering disproportionality arising from the organisation's re-vetting processes. DCS Andy Day and DS Ashleen Wright attended the meeting and provided an overview of Operations Onyx and Assure.
- 2. It was outlined for the Panel that:
 - Operation Onyx is reviewing all completed sexual offence or domestic abuse cases from the last 10 years involving serving officers or staff where the allegation did not result in a dismissal at the time.
 - Operation Assure reviews officer and staff vetting, triggered by a number of circumstances, including: the conclusion of a criminal investigation into an officer; following a misconduct hearing where a written warning, final written warning or a reduction in rank has been issued; or when adverse information about an individual comes to the notice of professional standards officers. Officers who can no longer pass vetting may be dismissed.
- 3. The Panel asked a number of questions regarding the operations and re-vetting to understand the processes. These covered issues such as the burden of proof for triggering re-vetting; actions that may trigger re-vetting; risk management; officers' rights to a private life.
- 4. The Panel agreed that it would develop terms of reference for this project and there was an initial discussion of the ethical questions they might wish to investigate. These included:
 - The offences that are the focus of Operation Onyx.

- Whether any disproportionality was a result of who is not being referred into the re-vetting process, rather than too many people with certain protected characteristics being referred in.
- Whether the potential for dismissal from failing re-vetting following a misconduct hearing could be considered double jeopardy and, if so, whether that was problematic.
- The balance between the Met's interests and the right for officers to have a private life.
- The retrospective application of present views.
- The expectation of a higher standard for Police officers.

Policing in Schools

- 5. The Panel reviewed its draft recommendations contained in its report on policing in schools.
- 6. It was agreed that the final draft of the report would now be sent to the MPS for fact checking ahead of publication.
